File Hills Qu’Appelle Tribal Council Patty Lou Tug-of-war Tuesday Only, Tug of War is a traditional Indigenous competition that pits two teams against each other in a test of strength. Each team pulls on opposite ends of the rope with the goal being to bring the centre

of the rope to a pre-determined distance in one direction against the will of the opposing team.

File Hills Qu'Appelle Tribal Council Education Department: TREATY 4 AMAZING RACE

The Treaty 4 Amazing Race is a competition/learning adventure in which teams of four people race around the Treaty Four grounds in competition with other teams. Teams strive to arrive first at "Pit Stops" at the end of each leg of the race and avoid coming in last, which carries the possibility of a significant disadvantage in the following leg. Contestants travel to areas within the treaty grounds on foot. Clues provided in each leg lead the teams to the next destination or direct them to perform a task, either together as a team or by a single member appointed by the team. These challenges are related to the history of Treaty 4, and the culture and languages within the Treaty 4 territory. Teams will be awarded with certificates of merit.

Title: Treaty Responsibility Bookmarks & Treaty Art-map

Blurb: Make your own bookmark reminder of what treaty and land means to you. Practice sharing who you are and where you are from, in Treaty 4 territory (and beyond, if applicable), as well as how you understand your treaty responsibilities. We will have resources available and invite small, informal conversations. Add a contribution to a collective treaty art-map too as a way to commemorate the 145th Year of Treaty 4.

From Audrey... Here is a more detailed explanation (in my meeting absence, in case anyone wants further clarification):

Our activity idea is 1) to invite informal conversations with student activity participants about who we and they are (related to treaty land) and where we/they are from in Treaty 4, as well as to have a Treaty 4 art piece map that they could choose to add to. For example, I am a white-Canadian who grew up on a farm near Kelliher, close to where my great-grandparents settled. I could put my name and/or a symbol for treaty land that is meaningful to me on the map; 2) there would be an invitation to create a representation of their perceived treaty responsibilities on a bookmark. For instance, I might choose a quote from the Treaty Elders of SK book about miskâsowin, why origin stories

are important in treaty contexts, along with the TRC #63iii Call to Action. And/or, in my own words and/or with sketches, I could note why land and treaty is important to me, along with associated responsibilities. We will bring resources to help with this. The bookmarks could be possible takeaway reminder of the Treaty 4 Gathering and treaty relationships.
